Re: Impact of Sequestration on Domestic HIV/AIDS Programs

Dear Leader Reid, Speaker Boehner, Leader McConnell, and Leader Pelosi:

On behalf of the AIDS Budget and Appropriations Coalition (ABAC), a work group of the Federal AIDS Policy Partnership (FAPP), and the undersigned organizations, we urge you and the President to reach an agreement that will prevent the devastating sequestration cuts to domestic HIV/AIDS programs that are scheduled to occur on January 2, 2013. Instead, we ask that you find a balanced solution that will address the federal deficit that does not cut critical non-defense discretionary programs and other programs such as Medicaid and Medicare that so many people with HIV/AIDS depend upon for their care and treatment.

We believe raising revenue is an essential part of a balanced approach to deficit reduction. Failure to include revenue increases will force additional harmful cuts to critical programs that will cost more in both lives and dollars over the long-term.

Sequestration cuts, scheduled to take place in just a few weeks, will reverse efforts to prevent HIV in our country and severely disrupt the system of lifesaving care and treatment that today serves over 500,000 low-income people with HIV/AIDS. With 50,000 new infections each year and a record 1.1 million people living with HIV/AIDS, we cannot turn our backs on the remarkable progress we have made in preventing and treating HIV/AIDS at a time when we know how to prevent and treat HIV.

Assuming that in FY 2013 sequestration cuts are 8.2 percent, below is a list of some of the discretionary programs that either provide care and treatment for people with HIV/AIDS, or

work to prevent future HIV infections. <u>Based on a calculation using FY12 spending levels, a total of \$538 million will be cut from these vital programs:</u>

The impact of these harmful cuts would translate into the following:

- **15,708 people** would lose access to crucial life-saving drugs due to a \$77 million cut to the AIDS Drug Assistance Program
- **4,738 households** would lose housing support
- 460 AIDS research grants would be eliminated

In addition to the programs above, people living with HIV or who are at risk of being infected with HIV depend on many other non-defense discretionary (NDD) and mandatory programs, including several at the CDC, Health Resources Services Administration (HRSA), Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), and others that will be cut by sequestration. NDD programs have already suffered substantial funding cuts over the past several years amounting to over a 15% funding reduction since 2010. Through the budget caps put in place by the Budget Control Act, NDD programs are slated to receive even more cuts over the next decade. With caseloads growing and new HIV infections occurring every day, these programs cannot afford to take additional reductions. Also, as you work toward a solution, please remember that Medicaid and Medicare are two of the largest payers of HIV/AIDS care and treatment in the nation and must be protected.
